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a message from the President & CEO of the SU Foundation

Dear Ship Family,

Two of the most positive and powerful words can never be said often enough—**Thank you!** And there is so much to be thankful for, starting with our Ship Family, which is truly amazing. But then we all knew that since Shippensburg University continues to rank first among all other universities in Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education in alumni annual giving, parent annual giving, and athletic giving. Ship ranked second in total charitable contributions, corporate giving, and charitable contributions for scholarships.

I am pleased to share with you the Shippensburg University Foundation's *2020-2021 Annual Impact Report* which showcases the stories of a few of the many students who were impacted by your gifts and donors who were inspired to make a major gift or a "legacy" planned gift. This Impact Report should also convey to you our sincere **thanks** and appreciation for responding to the call to help Ship students receive a quality education.

And what better examples of the quality of students who attend and graduate from Shippensburg University than the students who are featured in this Impact Report and share their stories about the impact your giving has made on their lives.

The Annual Fund surpassed the 3-million-dollar mark for the first time in the SU Foundation's history, raising a record \$3,029,374. I would like to acknowledge and **thank** National Annual Fund Co-Chairs, Wanda Polk Bankhead '80 and Craig Loundas '81 for their volunteer leadership to the SU Foundation, as well as their leadership team.

Charitable contributions to the SU Foundation totaled \$6,489,837. The financial support the SU Foundation can and does provide in support of students, faculty and programs at the University is a direct result of your charitable giving. This past academic year, \$4,395,782 in direct support benefitted students, faculty and programs. An additional \$1,149,520 was added to the principal of endowed funds that benefit Shippensburg University. A new record dollar amount, \$1,902,872, was provided for direct student aid last year, including scholarships, awards, and low-interest student loans. **Thank you** for being a part of achieving these milestones.

The SU Foundation's endowment grew by 32 percent this past year, topping the \$55 million mark for the first time in SU Foundation history. This means an additional \$130,000 will be available to award in scholarships for the 2022-2023 academic year.

Alumni Weekend this past June marked the first event at Shippensburg University since the pandemic began that alumni and friends could come together to celebrate the magnificent restoration of Stewart Hall. A special

thank you to the donors who made major gifts in support of this project, particularly Gary '68 and Mary Jo '69 Grove, who gave a significant challenge gift to kick-start the campaign in 2014. **Thank you** to all the donors who supported the restoration of Stewart Hall and to those who purchased bricks on the plaza in front of the building for themselves or someone who had played a meaningful role in their lives.

Our university is celebrating 150 years of its founding this year. Our university must remain strong and vital for our region and for the students we want to serve for the next 150 years. Likewise, our Foundation, which will be celebrating 45 years of supporting Shippensburg University in 2022, must also be able to support the needs of the students and faculty through private charitable dollars.

The Annual Fund provides support for annual needs. Many of the Ship Family support the Annual Fund, provide major gift dollars, and have also made a planned gift for the future. If there ever was a time to make your gift count, through the Annual Fund, a major gift, a planned gift or all three, now is the time. Now is the time to double down for Ship. With the stock market at an all-time high, now is the time to transfer those highly appreciated stocks to the SU Foundation. Now is the time to use your IRA to make your gift. Now is the time to think about the future of Ship and make a planned gift to the SU Foundation.

The SU Foundation Board of Directors, under the leadership of Joel Zullinger, are all volunteers and donors themselves who fully support this great University. These scholarship and other funds are available for the first time in 2021-2022.

Academic Scholarships

Karen Leitzel Bashore and Neil Bashore Scholarship – Mathematics This scholarship is for full-time, first-year students who are pursuing an undergraduate degree in mathematics with an applied mathematics or statistics concentration, or who are seeking certification to teach mathematics at the secondary level. Applicants must be PA residents, have a minimum GPA of 3.0, and demonstrate financial need.

John E. Clinton Scholarship This scholarship is for an upper division student who has completed at least 60 credits. Applicants must be enrolled in an undergraduate marketing, management or accounting degree program. First preference will be given to a transfer student from Harrisburg Area Community College who completed the coursework for an associate degree in business. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.2 and complete an official, compensated internship with the Shaner Group.

The Richard A. Cranney Sr. Veteran's Award This scholarship is for a full-time, first-year student who is an honorably discharged veteran of the United States armed forces, is serving actively, or has served in the National Guard or Reserves. The scholarship may be retained for three additional academic years.

Linda Mauger-Harnish and Martin Harnish College of Business Scholarship This scholarship is for full-time, first-year students pursuing an undergraduate degree administered by the John L. Grove College of Business. First preference will be given to PA residents. Applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.8 and demonstrate financial need.

Edward Christian Ruth Memorial Scholarship This scholarship is for current full-time students who have completed a minimum of 30 credits. Recipients must be residents of Bedford County, PA. First preference will be given to students pursuing an undergraduate degree administered by the John L. Grove College of Business who are members in good standing of Alpha Kappa Psi Business Fraternity.

Dr. Thomas and Mrs. Joan Schroeder Chemistry Scholarship This scholarship is for an upper division student pursuing an undergraduate degree in the Chemistry Department. Recipients must have earned a minimum of 30 credits, have a minimum GPA of 2.5, and demonstrate financial need.

Kathryn Hughes Seaber Educational Impact Scholarship This scholarship is for incoming full-time, first-year students who are pursuing an undergraduate degree administered

by the College of Education and Human Services. Applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.8, demonstrate a passion for helping others through volunteer service and extracurricular activities, and demonstrate financial need.

Skiles Excavating, Inc. Brandon E. Skiles Memorial Scholarship This scholarship is for full-time undergraduate students who have completed a minimum of 60 credits at Shippensburg University prior to benefiting from the scholarship. Applicants must be pursuing an undergraduate degree in civil or electrical engineering in the School of Engineering and have a minimum GPA of 2.8.

Foundation, is available to full-time, first-year students from Halifax High School (first preference) or Dauphin County, PA, who are pursuing an undergraduate degree program in science, mathematics, or computer science.

Ken and Ginny Gill Scholarship for Elementary Education (1 new award) This scholarship is for full-time, first-year students majoring in Early Childhood/Elementary Education (PreK-4). First preference is given to a student from Snyder County, PA. Second preference is given to any student residing in PA who has demonstrated financial need.

Ken and Ginny Gill Scholarship for Secondary Education (1 new award) This scholarship is for full-time, first-year students majoring in Secondary Education. First preference is given to students from Snyder County. Second preference is given to any student residing in PA. Recipients must have a 3.0 cumulative GPA and demonstrate financial need.

Phyllis Shambaugh Meenan Elementary Education Scholarship (1 new award) This scholarship is for full-time, first-year students majoring in elementary education. Recipients must be graduates of Carlisle High School.

University Bible Fellowship Scholarship This scholarship is for incoming full-time, first-year students. Applicants must have a minimum SAT score of 1200, rank in the top ten percent of their high school class, and demonstrate financial need.

W.J. Wollyung III College of Business Scholarship This scholarship is for incoming full-time, first-year students pursuing an undergraduate degree from the John L. Grove College of Business. Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 2.8 and demonstrate financial need.

Athletic Scholarship

McDonald Cziraky Women's Basketball Scholarship This scholarship is for a current student who is a member in good standing of the Shippensburg University women's basketball team. First preference is given to students pursuing an undergraduate degree from the John L. Grove College of Business. Second preference is given to students pursuing an undergraduate degree in engineering. The recipient must have a minimum GPA of 3.0.

Martin and Linda's Story



Attending college can be a life-changing experience. It was for Linda Mauger-Harnish and Martin Harnish. When they left Ship more than 30 years ago, they left with an education that would open doors to successful careers, with the love of their lives, and with lifelong friends who remain in touch.

The couple has given back by establishing a scholarship for the students in the John L. Grove College of Business.

"Shippensburg gave us the foundation to build a successful and meaningful life," they said. "We intend to provide that same foundation to other deserving students."

Both Linda and Martin earned Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degrees, Martin in 1986 with an accounting major and Linda in 1987 with a marketing major and speech communications minor. After graduation Martin joined the United States Air Force where he gained hands-on experience in information technology (IT). Linda began her business career in the Washington, D.C. area while Martin was stationed in Korea. In 1989, a year after Martin returned to the U.S., the couple was married, and moved to Cocoa Beach, Florida

After the military, Martin and Linda remained in Florida, and Martin embarked on a successful career in the IT industry. Linda continued her education, obtaining several professional designations and earning a Master of Business Administration from Palm Beach Atlantic University. Linda built a career in human resources for more than 20 years. Currently she uses her professional skills to fulfill her passion to serve others, working with seniors and youth in need.

"We believe in helping others," Linda explained. Once the first **Linda Mauger-Harnish and Martin Harnish College of Business Scholarship** is awarded they plan to meet the recipient and establish a relationship. The scholarship is intended for students with financial need who otherwise might not be able to attend a university. To future recipients they stated, "We hope this scholarship will provide you the opportunity to chase your dreams so you can live your best life."

Jim and Carol's Story

Jim and Carol (Hartman) Replogle earned their teaching degrees from Shippensburg in 1954 when the school was named Shippensburg State Teachers College and it cost approximately \$750 per year to attend. Their degrees opened doors to a lifetime of fulfillment that inspired the couple to establish a scholarship for education majors.

"We really appreciated being able to get a college education at a reasonable rate," Jim said adding, "That's not the case anymore."

Carol was fortunate that her parents were able to pay her costs, but Jim needed to work to fund his education. Both took jobs as waiters in Old Main's dining room, and Jim spent his summers working with his father doing construction work.

"Because we worked in the dining hall, we knew most students by name, or at least recognized their faces," Carol said. "There were only about 700 students then. Now it's a different world, a different time."

What has not changed is the value of an education. "We believe in education," declared Jim, who earned master's and doctoral degrees



in educational administration. Jim served in Pennsylvania school systems for 35 years. He taught in the Hanover and Kennett Square school districts and was an elementary school principal and assistant superintendent in the North Penn School District. He then served as superintendent of the Boyertown Area School District for 15 years, retiring in 1989. Always the educator, Jim

joined the faculty of Salisbury State University, now Salisbury University, as an assistant professor and taught for eight years before retiring (again) in 1997. Carol taught business education in Spring Grove, Norristown, and Kennett Square districts.

The first **James R. and Carol Hartman Replogle Education Scholarship** was awarded to an elementary education major

last fall. "We're pleased to be teamed up with an individual," Jim said. Carol nodded in agreement, "It makes it more real."

For current and future education students at Shippensburg, the Replogle Education Scholarship will help to make the dream of teaching become real.

Vera and John's Story

The Wood Honors College at Shippensburg University holds a special place for Professor Emeritus Dr. Vera Blinn Reber. During her 37-year tenure in the Department of History, she served as director of the Honors Program for four years, from 1991 to 1995. In honor of the 40th anniversary of Honors at Shippensburg, Vera is providing seed money to establish the Wood Honors College Endowment for International Education.

Vera explained that she and her husband, Dr. John Offner, also a professor emeritus of the history department at Shippensburg, wanted to provide students with the same educational opportunities that they were able to provide for their daughter Stella.

"We were fortunate to be able to provide Stella with an undergraduate education at Wellesley College where, with our financial help, she was able to conduct research and to study abroad in Oxford, England," Vera said. These two opportunities in particular, Vera said, helped Stella to advance to graduate school at the University of California Berkeley, and postdoctoral fellowships at Harvard and Yale.

Stella is now on the faculty of The University of Texas at Austin.

"We could afford to do that for her, but there are many equally competent students who do not have the same support," Vera said.

The **Wood Honors College Endowment for International Education** will support program expenses for the Honors International Seminar to be offered every other summer. "This is not intended to be a tourist experience, but a learning experience where students can learn alongside, and become friends with students from other parts of the world."

While Vera provided seed money to establish this endowment, she is hopeful that others will also give to fund the endowment for the benefit of future Honors students.

He credits his professors for helping him find a career he enjoys. "I first heard about supply chain management from Dr. Ian Langella," Bryan said of the chair of the Department of Finance and Supply Chain Management. "I found the overall variability very appealing. No two days are alike." Bryan is on track to graduate in December 2021 with a supply chain major and economics minor.

Bryan is also a member of the Wood Honors College and has served as a college ambassador and mentor, and this year is serving as a Senator for the Student Government Association.

A native of Lititz, Bryan gained practical experience with an internship at Clark Associates in Lancaster during summer 2020. He said the experience confirmed that "Shippensburg is doing an outstanding job in preparing students for the real world."

His second internship was with Amazon this past summer, a 10-week assignment in Cranbury, New Jersey. "As an outbound area manager intern, I hired and managed about 50 ship dock workers. It was a unique experience requiring that I solve problems daily."

Thanks to these experiences and his Shippensburg education Bryan will be joining the logistics team at East Penn Manufacturing after graduation.

Cooper Grove a senior pre-med biology major who has his sights set on becoming a physician. The Dr. William E. Peightel Scholarship he received has helped him toward that goal. "This scholarship means I am able to continue my education without fear of accumulating excessive debt while here at Shippensburg," Cooper said, adding, "I have a lot of years of schooling and payments ahead of me."

A native of Needmore, Cooper was inspired to pursue medicine because of his grandfather. When Cooper was just a toddler his grandfather nearly died from cardiac arrest. Cooper explains, "I credit the hard work of the medical staff for giving me the opportunity to know my grandfather. He lived another 12 years, and I got to know the greatest influence and role model in my life."

An Honors student, Cooper stepped into many leadership positions on campus including serving on the executive board for the Wood Honors College, as president of Tri-Beta National Biology Honors Society, and on the National Honors fraternity, Phi Sigma Pi. He has also been a peer mentor for first-year students housed on campus in the Biology Living Learning Community.

Cooper has begun to apply to medical schools and says he "feels tremendously prepared" for this next step thanks to the education and support he has received at Shippensburg.

Malayna's Story

Malayna Rowe graduated in May and immediately started the master's program in Physician Assistant Studies at Marywood University in Pennsylvania. Her Bachelor of Science in Exercise Science was a good stepping stone to the graduate school and her experience conducting research at Shippensburg was also a plus.

"Research definitely played a role in getting into graduate school. Even the process of finding reliable scientific data has given me an edge in grad school. Not every student has had that experience," Malayna said.

The Wood Honors College provided opportunities to challenge herself. For her senior capstone project, Malayna selected a research project that interested her as a student athlete. A sprinter/hurdler on Shippensburg's track and field team, Malayna studied the possible negative side effects of non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as Ibuprofen, on college athletes. "Athletes may rely on them to treat pain, control swelling, and help with muscle soreness. However, recent studies have shown NSAIDs can cause cellular injury or gastrointestinal dysfunction," she explained.

It was also important to Malayna to participate in service activities that helped others. She served as president of Tau Kappa (a women's athletics honor society), treasurer of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, and was a participant in Reach Out, an Honors service-learning project that supports a school in the Dominican Republic. "I wanted to make an impact on someone other than myself while at Shippensburg," Malayna said.

"Aloe and Ivy Greenhouse and More is essentially a 'Build-A-Bear' style greenhouse where people create living products they can be responsible for," Lindsey explained. Confessed houseplant enthusiasts, Lindsey and Alex were "very excited" to receive third place and the \$2,500 in prize money for investment in their startup.

This wasn't the first time the pair had teamed up. Alex reported, "Lindsey and I had been working together in entrepreneur classes for a majority of our time at Shippensburg." They were also both members of the Wood Honors College, which fosters a sense of community with common first-semester classes. "Everyone shared the same passion and dedication for learning," Lindsey remarked, adding, "All of the Honors course professors were amazing."

Since graduating in May, Alex has been working at Letterkenny Army Depot in the Business Development Office. Lindsey, a Duncannon native, relocated to Kalamazoo, Michigan, where her partner and fellow Honors College graduate, Thomas Fisher, is working on his doctorate. She is employed as a copywriter for WebFX, a Harrisburg-based digital marketing agency that allows her to work remotely.



Maria's Story



One of the reasons senior Maria Drake chose Shippensburg to study biology is that she wouldn't have to wait until graduate school to conduct research. With the support of research grants, Maria has partnered with Dr. Pablo Delis, professor of biology, on a long-running research project on amphibian communities on North Mountain in Franklin County.

A lover of the outdoors, Maria said she enjoyed working in the field. "We set recorders in the field that capture frog calls and note the time and date of when they are recorded." Maria explained, "We are looking at effects of climate change that might impact when the frogs call. This is important as they are bioindicators." They are also looking at the density and species of frogs that have moved into the newly restored wetlands at the base of the mountain.

"Through working with Dr. Delis," Maria said, "I am learning the fundamentals of all the different parts of research from writing a grant to conducting research."

These are essential skills to advance her career goals. Maria has been accepted to Shippensburg's 4+1 master's program in biology and is starting graduate classes while finishing her Bachelor of Science in Biology with a concentration in ecology and environmental science. "I eventually want to earn a doctorate and become a professor," she said. "I hope to help create a healthier planet and educate students so that they can do the same."

The 2020 COVID pandemic had a profound impact on education, particularly for the very young. Early childhood education/PreK-4 majors Gabby Wood and Morgan Will were tutoring local students during the pandemic and saw just how much student learning was impacted. They responded by developing a research project to combat the education void.

"We decided to create virtual field trips because due to COVID we were seeing in real time that the kids were missing out on important learning experiences in the classroom," Morgan said. "We wanted to supplement the loss of learning with an activity that provided both an educational experience and a fun experience."

With funding from two endowed research funds, they launched their project. "We went out and filmed three locations and then created a curriculum that supported those trips and

Pennsylvania state standards," Gabby explained. Morgan added, "We added the field trip video and photos to a PowerPoint document that can be shared across multiple classrooms with multiple students at a time."

Gabby was able to use the Crayola Factory virtual field trip with a language arts lesson during her student teaching experience. "My students absolutely loved the experience. The results were more than what I expected."

The team also created virtual field trips to Camden Aquarium with a science lesson and to Hershey Chocolate World for math.

Since graduating in May 2021, Gabby is teaching second grade in the Chambersburg Area School District, and Morgan is teaching fifth grade in the Lebanon School District

SHIP STUDENTS NEEDED A LITTLE HELP... and the SHIP family responded.

The SU Foundation, with the assistance of the Office of Financial Aid, awarded over \$24,000 in grants for tuition, housing, textbooks, and food assistance. The Student Emergency Fund was established during the pandemic with donor contributions to the SU Foundation to assist undergraduate students who have immediate financial needs that directly affect their ability

to continue their education at Ship. The fund is intended to be a supplemental financial resource when students are unable to meet immediate and essential expenses due to times of crisis such as illness or death of a family member, medical emergency, or job loss. The grants are not meant to replace financial aid, and do not need to be repaid.

The fund is open to all students with priority given to students with the highest financial need. A maximum amount of \$500 may be requested each academic semester. Financial needs may include assistance with purchasing textbooks and/or course-related materials, paying for tuition, campus meal plans, or student housing.

Bill's Story

HONOR SOCIETY MEMBER

Bill Wollyung, Class of 1985, had a rough first year at Shippensburg. Halfway through the year, his father lost his job, which left Bill to find a way to pay for school himself. Thankfully, Bill was awarded a full scholarship for financially disadvantaged students that allowed him to stay in school and earn his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree in accounting. That degree launched a successful business career that culminated with his current position of President/CEO of Aegis Security Insurance Company.

Grateful for the support he received at Shippensburg, Bill is giving back by establishing the W.J. Wollyung III College of Business Scholarship, an endowed scholarship for financially needy students in the college.

"I still get choked up remembering the struggles of my first few months at Shippensburg," said Bill. In addition to financial assistance, he found encouragement and support from his professors in the business college. "The accessibility of the professors and their devotion to students is a benefit you don't really appreciate until you experience it."

Bill's first goal after graduation was to achieve a



Certified Public Accounting license, which he accomplished in 1987.

His first job was with Ernst & Whinney, which later merged with another firm to become Ernst & Young. After 18 months, he moved to Smoker, Smith & Associates, PC, a regional firm where he spent seven years gaining a breadth of experience with diverse clientele.

In 1992, he stepped into the private sector taking a position as controller with Aegis Security

Company. "I thought it would be a short-term job, but here I am 29 years later as President and CEO," he mused. "It was a small firm when I joined, and I was able to learn insurance from the ground up, including the interworking of various departments." Bill was promoted to Chief Financial Officer (CFO) in 1998 and helped build the company from \$25 million in gross premiums to more than \$250 million. In 2008, he led the development and implementation of a long-term strategic plan that supported controlled profitable growth devoted to risk management and customer relationship for which the company was founded. He said he enjoyed the CFO position and would have continued in there until retirement, but in 2016 the

company was sold, and the new owners offered him the top spot of President and CEO.

The first W.J. Wollyung III College of Business Scholarship was awarded this fall and will continue to help students to pursue and achieve their dreams and career plans. Bill also made a planned gift of retirement assets through an IRA designation that will substantially support the scholarship in the future.

Gifts of Retirement Assets




The SU Foundation manages 439 endowment fund accounts, 264 temporarily restricted accounts, and 73 temporary service accounts.



SU students, faculty, and programs benefited from **\$4,395,782** in direct support while **\$1,149,520** was added to the principal of endowed funds that benefit Shippensburg University.

Understanding Direct and Indirect Support: Direct support is dollars that are restricted by the donor for a specific purpose and are spent on behalf of the University, at the direction of a University releasing agent (Dean, Department Chair, Director, etc.). The exceptions to restricted dollars in this category are the grants awarded to the University from the SU Foundation Board of Directors at the request of the President of the University. Indirect support refers to dollars that donors have contributed to the principal of an endowment for the benefit of students, programs, and faculty, and are restricted by the donor for a specific purpose.

Over the past 10 years, funding from the SU Foundation to support students, faculty, and programs at Shippensburg University totaled **\$51,777,319**.





Sources of contributions by category


Alumni, friends, and businesses are the largest sources of contributions to the SU Foundation






TOTAL SUPPORT TO SHIPPENSBURG UNIVERSITY

ENDOWMENT FUND BALANCE

Endowments provide funds in perpetuity for scholarships, department funds, student research, faculty research and scholarly activity, and much more. The SU Foundation's endowment grew by 32 percent this past year which will mean an additional \$130,000 will be available to award in scholarships for the 2022-2023 academic year. The SU Foundation endowment finished the year at a record high of over **\$55.52 million.**
