

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
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a message from the President & CEO of the SU Foundation

Dear Ship Family,

This year, 2022, marked a significant milestone in the history of the SU Foundation – its 45th anniversary. The Shippensburg State College Foundation was established on April 27, 1977, changing its name to the Shippensburg University Foundation in 1984.

During these past 45 years, the SU Foundation has impacted every aspect of the campus and community. Look around the campus and you can see the impact donors have made who contributed to the SU Foundation starting with the restoration of Old Main and continuing with Shippen Hall and Stewart Hall and the construction of the Mathematics/Computer Science Center, Grove Hall, the H. Ric Luhrs Performing Arts Center, and adjacent to campus, the Cora I Grove Spiritual Center and Interfaith Chapel.

Most recently, the University and Foundation held a very special celebration on September 27th to name the School of Engineering and Engineering Laboratory for Milton and Doreen Morgan, for their significant philanthropy to the Shippensburg University Foundation. Their gift will advance the University's School of Engineering and President Patterson's vision that will have an immediate and lasting impact on the lives of Ship's engineering students and meet a growing talent need in our region's economy.

Last year I wrote in this space that if there ever was a time to make your gift count, through the Annual Fund, a major gift, a planned gift, or all three, now was that time. Now was that time to double down for Ship. I am pleased to share with you that the Ship Family responded, as you always do! The SU Foundation raised \$8,960,054 this past fiscal year, **which is the highest contribution total in the history of the Foundation.**

We are grateful for your generosity, whether your giving is unrestricted to support Ship's greatest needs, for scholarship support, the student emergency fund, academic departments, athletics, the library, the Luhrs Center—the Foundation has hundreds of funds that alumni, parents, friends, students, university employees, and businesses, contribute annually to assist our students in receiving a quality education.

We thank Wanda Polk Bankhead '80 and Craig Loundas '81 for serving these past two years as our National Annual Fund Co-Chairs. And we welcome and thank David '80 and Laurie '79 Morgan for agreeing to serve this fiscal year as National Annual Fund Co-chairs.

Many of our university faculty and retired faculty make annual gifts, major gifts, and planned gifts to the SU Foundation. This *Annual Impact Report* focuses on a generous retired faculty member, who passed away in October 2020. We learned last year that Dr. James Sieber, who was also a 1958 Ship alumnus, had included the SU Foundation in his estate. The Dr. James L. Sieber Scholarship Fund was established to benefit future generations of Shippensburg University students pursuing undergraduate degrees in computer science and computer engineering. Beginning in 2023-2024, nine students will start to benefit from Dr. Sieber's scholarship and nine additional students each year thereafter as the endowment continues to grow.

We thank Dr. Sara Grove, chair of the political science department, for serving as the faculty liaison to the SU Foundation's Board of Directors for several years, and for serving as the chair of the campus campaign and inspiring her faculty colleagues to join her in giving to the SU Foundation.

Our 45-year-old Shippensburg University Foundation, under the leadership of Board Chair, Joel Zullinger, which comprises a small staff, but many volunteers and donors, commits to do our level best to support the needs of the students and faculty through private charitable giving. We congratulate Dr. Charles Patterson, our university's 18th president, and his equally committed spouse and partner, Colleen. We look forward to working with President Patterson, his executive leadership team, and the Council of Trustees, under the leadership of chair, Andrew Alosi.

These pages of the *Annual Impact Report* are the stories of benefactors who are making an impact on students and the stories of Ship students who are taking full advantage of the opportunities you and thousands of other donors are providing for them and other students.

a message from the President of Shippensburg University

Dear Shippensburg University family and friends,
I am honored to serve as Shippensburg University's 18th president and am humbled by your continued loyalty to and pride in our institution.

Our Ship community continues to do great things, and I am confident in our ability to tackle the challenges we face and capitalize on the many opportunities that are ahead of us. Being a strong and resilient institution is made possible by, and is a reflection of the dedication of, the SU Foundation. One of my top priorities upon my arrival at Ship was to advance priorities that allow Shippensburg University and the SU Foundation to leverage our collective strengths for the benefit of our Raider students.

I am proud to say that our Shippensburg University Foundation continues to outpace its peers and is ranked first in alumni giving, parent giving, unrestricted giving, and private giving that supports our Raider Athletics.

We are grateful for all of you – our alumni, friends, and donors of Ship – who manifest your love and support for Shippensburg University through your giving. Your support greatly enhances the college experience and positively transforms the lives of our Raider students.

This fall, with the SU Foundation, we announced the naming of the Milton and Doreen Morgan School of Engineering and Engineering Laboratory. The Morgan's transformational gift will impact engineering students today and for generations to come.

I'm also pleased to share early indicators of enrollment stabilization and growth. This fall we experienced a 5.6 percent increase in first-time undergraduate enrollments and double-digit increases in students originating from our neighboring counties. The average GPA of incoming students increased from 3.2 to 3.3 and we celebrated increases in retention and graduation rates.

These accomplishments are not mine to claim, but are instead the work of dedicated teams, faculty and staff, students, alumni, donors, and friends of Ship. The people are what make Ship great, and it is the interactions among us that create a strong sense of belonging and connection.

Ship was recognized for its sustainability efforts as one of only four universities named a Green Ribbon School by the US Department of Education. The Mathematics Department was awarded a \$1.4 million grant from the National Science Foundation to address math teacher shortages in our region. We were also named a PA Hunger Free Campus, an initiative that features a coalition of colleges and universities focused on addressing hunger and other basic needs of students.

There is no shortage of student achievement to highlight too! This past year we celebrated a student awarded a Fulbright English Teaching Assistantship and a member of our student media gaining exclusive access to document NASA's Artemis launch. A chemistry student's research led to the use of state-of-the-art fingerprint technology in a local district attorney's office, and Wood Honors College students created a first-of-its-kind voter data map that was utilized by news media during the recent election.

We are thankful for the leadership and support provided by the Council of Trustees, led by chairman Drew Alosi and the work of the SU Foundation, under the direction of board chair Joel Zullinger and SU Foundation president and CEO Dr. Leslie Folmer Clinton. Colleen and I feel truly honored to be a part of the Shippensburg University community and that includes you!

We look forward to continuing our service to this great institution, and your support is instrumental to advancing the role this great university serves in the lives of our Raider students. Go Ship!

Shippensburg University and the Shippensburg University Foundation announced the naming of the Milton and Doreen Morgan School of Engineering and Laboratory on September 27, 2022, during a ceremony to honor the couple's transformational gift.



"The desire to achieve perfection drives innovation towards a goal we will never achieve, but as we

advance technologically, the demand for engineers in multiple disciplines explodes exponentially. Shippensburg University has taken a leadership position as the only Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education School offering a program with various engineering degrees. Dory and I are thrilled to have a role in advancing this program to the next level, the School of Engineering," said Milton K. Morgan III '76.

The School of Engineering offers computer science, computer engineering, software engineering, and electrical engineering, all of which are ABET accredited. Civil engineering and mechanical engineering will be going through the ABET accreditation process in 2023. In 2020, the university renovated its decommissioned steam plant to create a state-of-the-art lab space where students gain hands-on experience as engineers. All six programs in the school focus on solving real-world problems and prioritize a balance of theory and hands-on experience.

The Morgan's investment in Shippensburg University students provides for an engineering scholarship endowment, an engineering research endowment, equipment and instrumentation for the engineering laboratory, and angel investment dollars which will provide seed funds for student projects.

An innovator himself, Milton Morgan began working at J. Walter Miller Company, which was started in a one-car garage in Lancaster in 1887 by his great grandfather. The company grew into a major manufacturer of commercial brass and bronze

castings, and in 1986, he was named president of the company. One of the major accomplishments during his presidency was the reduction of the company's dependency on the fire protection industry from 98 percent to 30 percent of its production, while at the same time continuing to maintain its position as the largest producer of sand cast sprinkler heads in the country. He continued to expand the business by acquiring a machine shop and establishing a consumer products division prior to retiring in 2015.

"Milt and Dory Morgan's significant philanthropy to the SU Foundation will advance the mission of Shippensburg University's School of Engineering and President Patterson's vision that will make an immediate and lasting impact on the lives of Ship's engineering students. The naming of an academic college or school is the highest level of recognition the university can bestow."

Thank you, Diana Beecher, for 30 years of service to the SU Foundation!



Ms. Diana Beecher '70 served as a valued member of the SU Foundation's Board of Directors for 30 years. She provided her expertise, insight, and vision gained through her senior executive service to major Wall Street national and international firms such as Citibank, Travelers Insurance, Morgan Stanley, and S. G. Warburg & Co.

Diana was elected to the position of Vice Chairperson of the SU Foundation's Board of Directors. In 2001, she was appointed to the Investment Committee and continued to serve on that committee

for 21 years, chairing it for the past 18. During her tenure, the Investment Committee embraced modern portfolio management for the Endowment where under her guidance, it grew from \$16,817,925 to \$53,120,528.

Diana also held various Annual Fund and campaign leadership positions throughout her service on the Board. The SU Foundation Board and staff offer their sincere appreciation to Diana for selflessly giving of her time, talent, and financial resources to the Shippensburg University Foundation.

These are just a few of the stories shared by donors who were inspired to make a major gift because they valued the great education they received at SHIP. We hope you are as inspired by their stories as we are.

Stewart's Story

Stewart Connard did not set out to spend 36 years with the IRS, but that's where his successful career took him. He earned his degree in business education from Shippensburg in 1970 with majors in accounting and management. After college, he briefly taught high school business and worked at a bank in his hometown of Philadelphia. In 1973, the IRS offered him an entry-level position as an Internal Revenue Agent in Baltimore, Maryland.



During his years at the IRS, Stewart specialized in taxation of partnerships, real estate, high-wealth individuals, as well as abusive tax shelters. "It was an invaluable experience to learn how wealth is created or

lost!" he said. "The experience helped me to invest in real estate and the stock market."

Later in his career, he was promoted to Partnership Technical Advisor and traveled the country advising IRS agents on complex partnership audits and assisting with litigation of civil and criminal tax cases. He retired in 2009.

Beyond his government service, Stewart is dedicated to serving others. "My parents always encouraged charitable giving and helping others in need," he explained. His father, the Rev. George W. Connard, was the pastor of the Somerton United Methodist Church from 1949 to 1980. His mother, Martha Stewart Connard, was a teacher in the Philadelphia School District.

In appreciation for the education he received at Shippensburg, Stewart established the W. Stewart Connard Accounting Scholarship to help deserving students with their higher education costs. "Shippensburg gave me the proper training that helped my career," Stewart said. "My hope is that recipients of my accounting scholarship will be successful in their careers and will also be able to help others."

Major gifts have a significant and immediate impact and open a world of possibilities for Ship students.

Gary and Mary Jo's Story

"What are we waiting for?" That's what alumni couple Gary '68&'70M and Mary Jo '69&'70M Grove concluded after hearing the benefits of endowing a scholarship while still alive, rather than after death through their wills.

"We heard another alumnus talk about being able to see the fruits of his scholarship by meeting the student recipients at the SU Foundation's annual Spirit of Generosity Scholarship Dinner," Gary said. "We had always intended to set up scholarships as part of our wills, but we decided to do it now so we can see the impact."

The Gary L. Grove STEM Scholarship and the Mary Jo Kreider Grove STEM Scholarship are full-tuition scholarships for students majoring in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) fields, including education majors pursuing secondary education certification in these fields.

Mary Jo and Gary studied STEM fields at Shippensburg. When they met at Ship in 1966, Gary was a biology major with a chemistry minor. Mary Jo majored in mathematics and minored in physics. He graduated in 1968, and when she graduated later that year, they were married.

Gary earned his M.Ed. in Biology from Shippensburg and his Ph.D. in Physiology from Pennsylvania State University. Mary Jo earned her M.Ed. in Mathematics from Shippensburg and an M.S. in Computer Science from Villanova University.

The Groves credit their Shippensburg education as the basis of their professional success. "Ship made me the person I am today," remarked Gary, a Chambersburg native. "In almost everything I've done I can see where Ship gave me the foundation that allowed me to be very successful."

After starting their careers, raising their three children, and establishing their company cyberDERM, the Groves reengaged with the University through various volunteer leadership positions. In 2010, they agreed to serve as National Co-Chairs for the SU Foundation's very successful Charting the Course, Lighting the Way— the Campaign for Shippensburg University, which secured over \$69 million in cash and commitments. Mary Jo said they accepted this role because they wanted to give back. "We feel that Shippensburg is part of our family and we want to help them in any way we can."

Over the years, the Groves have served the University and the Foundation in many more ways, volunteering their time and expertise. They have been members of the College of Arts and Sciences Advisory Board since 2002, National Annual Fund Co-Chairs, Thankathon Volunteers, and Philadelphia Region Co-Chairs. Mary Jo served as Alumni Board President (1998-99) and since 2001 has been a member of the SU Foundation Board of Directors, currently serving as its Vice Chair.



Over the past five years, the SU Foundation has provided \$8,040,855 in scholarships and loans to support Shippensburg University students.

These scholarships and other funds are now available to award in 2022-2023.

Academic Scholarships

Carol Kooken Gimmi Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship is for entering full-time, first-year students majoring in elementary education or English with secondary education certification. Preference will be given to students majoring in elementary education. Recipients must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 and demonstrate financial need by completing the FAFSA. This scholarship may be retained for an additional three consecutive academic years provided retention requirements are met.

Robert J. Lieblein College of Business Scholarship

This scholarship is for a first-year student pursuing an undergraduate degree administered by the John L. Grove College of Business. Recipients must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 and first preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need. This scholarship may be retained for an additional three consecutive academic years provided retention requirements are met.

Brenda M. Albert Gabler Scholarship for Elementary Education

This scholarship is for a full-time, first-year student majoring in elementary education. First preference will be given to students residing in Lebanon County, Pennsylvania, with second preference given to students residing in any county in Pennsylvania. Students must demonstrate financial need by completing the FAFSA.

Mary Jo Kreider Grove STEM Scholarship

This scholarship is for incoming full-time, first-year, female students pursuing an undergraduate major in a STEM field (Science, Technology, Engineering or Mathematics) or pursuing an undergraduate degree to teach a STEM field with secondary education certification. Students must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 and demonstrate financial need by completing the FAFSA.

Gary L. Grove STEM Scholarship

This scholarship is for incoming full-time, first-year, male students pursuing an undergraduate major in a STEM field (Science, Technology, Engineering or Mathematics) or pursuing an undergraduate degree to teach a STEM field with secondary education certification. Students must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 and demonstrate financial need by completing the FAFSA.

McArthur Family Scholarship

This scholarship is for a full-time, first-year student pursuing an undergraduate degree program administered by the Milton and Doreen Morgan School of Engineering. First preference will be given to students majoring in computer science. Recipients must have a minimum grade point average of 2.8 and demonstrate financial need by completing the FAFSA.

David O. McCain III and R. L. Louisa McCain Engineering Excellence Scholarship

This scholarship is for entering first-year students pursuing an undergraduate degree in mechanical engineering from the Milton and Doreen Morgan School of Engineering. Recipients must have a minimum GPA of 3.5. This scholarship may be retained for an additional three consecutive academic years provided retention requirements are met.

Zook-Diodato College of Business Scholarship

This scholarship is for full-time undergraduate students who have completed at least 30 credits at Shippensburg University prior to benefiting from the scholarship. The student must be pursuing an undergraduate degree administered by the John L. Grove College of Business. The recipient must have a minimum GPA of 2.8, and first preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Janet Zullinger Scholarship

This scholarship is for entering full-time, first-year students pursuing an undergraduate degree administered by the Education Department. Recipients must have a minimum GPA of 3.0.

Athletic Scholarship

Tamara Ovejera 4 Tam Scholarship

This scholarship is for entering full-time, first-year students or a current member in good standing of the SU women's track and field team. First preference will be given to student-athletes who are throwers.

During a high school class trip to Costa Rica, Theresa Ward witnessed extreme poverty for the first time, and it changed her. The Philadelphia-area native decided to study sociology so she could make a difference.

Theresa enrolled at Shippensburg as a sociology major. Now a senior, she's added minors in political science and disability studies to help her reach her goals. "I want to conduct

social research to identify sources of a problem and use the data to inform public policy," she said.

Last year, she collaborated on a research project with Dr. Lawrence Eppard, associate professor of sociology/anthropology, which examined select social and economic costs of inequality in Virginia. "It was a great opportunity to conduct research on the inequality of place and social disadvantages," she said, "a topic I am very interested in."

A research scholarship helped support the project. "I'm grateful for any financial help," said Theresa who worked multiple jobs to fund her education. She added that her H.O.P.E. Diversity Scholarship helped her pay for books and school supplies.

Theresa graduates in December and believes her undergraduate research experience will help her secure admission to a high-quality graduate program to pursue a doctorate in sociology or public policy.

Honors student Erika Ebersole suspected her team had bitten off more than they could chew with their senior research project. The group of four Morgan School of Engineering students had chosen to design, build, and install a javelin throwing training device in just 15 weeks.

"It was an ambitious project," she admits, "but we had the support of the entire Morgan School of Engineering." Her group included two other mechanical engineering majors, Khiem Thieu and Richard Gordon, and computer engineering major Russell Stevens.

Erika had suggested the project. She was a javelin thrower on the Women's Track and Field Team and understood the challenges of training in the winter. They designed equipment that gives real-time feedback on force, acceleration and expected distance as if a real javelin were thrown.

Dr. Joao Paulo Dias, assistant professor of engineering, was their project advisor. "During

Trevor's Story

Trevor Woolwine came to Shippensburg knowing he wanted to teach high school math when he graduated. He was drawn to the university because of the excellence of its teacher education program, Wood Honors College, and men's swimming.

"I wanted to enroll in the Wood Honors College for the academic challenge," Trevor explained. "I had great professors and there is a sense of community in the college."

For his Honors capstone project, Trevor examined Shippensburg's ESTEEM program (Exploring Science, Technology, Engineering, Earth Science, and Mathematics). "This is an annual event that invites seventh grade girls to campus to explore careers in the STEM disciplines," he explained. "The program started in 2012. I surveyed former participants to see if the girls continued their interest in the STEM fields," he said.

For his swimming career, Trevor was a nine-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Championships individual place winner, including in the 200-yard freestyle, 100-yard backstroke, 100-yard freestyle and 200-yard individual medley. He is the first SU men's swimmer since 2017 to be named to the Academic All-District II At-Large Team.

Trevor graduated in May and is teaching math at a high school in Reading. While he has always been thankful for the scholarships he received, he now fully appreciates the impact. "Having scholarships took all the financial burden off after graduation. I graduated debt free."

SHIP students need a little help and the SHIP family continues to respond.

The SU Foundation, with the assistance of the Office of Financial Aid, awarded **over \$48,000** in grants from the SU Foundation's Student Emergency Fund for tuition assistance, housing, textbooks, and food since the fund's inception.

About the fund: The Student Emergency Fund was established with donor contributions to the SU Foundation to assist undergraduate students who have immediate financial needs that directly affect their ability to continue their education at Ship.

The fund is open to all students with priority given to students with the highest financial need. A maximum amount of \$500 may be requested each academic semester. Financial needs may include assistance with purchasing textbook and/or course-related materials, tuition, food, student housing, or other emergencies.

Lauren's Story

Lauren Stains enrolled in Shippensburg's chemistry program four years ago without a future job in mind. "I just knew I liked math and science, and that I was good at it," Lauren said. By the time the Chambersburg resident earned her B.S. in Chemistry with a mathematics minor in May, she was a working chemist and business owner.

The seed for a business started in her sophomore year when Lauren's analytical chemistry professor, Dr. John Richardson, invited her to join him on a project. "Dr. Richardson had been working with a local kombucha brewer, consulting on issues of quality control. He brought me in to run tests for her," she recalled.

"Kombucha has a complicated fermentation process," Lauren explained about the fermented tea, which is consumed for its purported health benefits. "The chemistry is interesting," Lauren said. "It keeps my mind working on problem solving."

Because the growing kombucha industry is

underserved, they launched Cultured Analysis in March 2021, which provides product testing and consulting for kombucha brewers from across the country. It also provides a research lab for students. For her senior year, Dr. Richardson and Dr. Jeb Kegerreis, associate professor of chemistry, designed a research project that would apply both her analytical and mathematics skills.

"I would not have had the opportunity for a custom research project at another, larger university," Lauren noted. "With a hands-on research project, I got a taste for working on my own and testing my theories. I gained confidence as a chemist."

Senior Courtney Graf wants a career that gives her the power to impact many lives. That's why she is majoring in both Early Childhood Education (PK-4) and Special Education to become a teacher.

A New Jersey native, Courtney chose Shippensburg for its on-campus elementary school. Beginning in Spring 2021, Courtney worked with Grace B. Luhrs University Elementary School students as a part of a research project developed in collaboration with teacher education faculty members, Drs. Andrea Malmont, Allison Mellot, and Gwendolyn Brown-Jackson and Professor Holly Garner.

Courtney's research titled, "Makerspace: Engaging K-12 Learners and Growing A Society of Critical Thinkers and Innovators," involved students working together to think through a real-world problem. "In a makerspace, students collaborate to draw up blueprints, build a model, and put the model under test conditions," she explained. "Through this process they learn analytical thinking, collaboration, teamwork, time management, problem solving and more."

A grant from the Anita E. (May) Weiss Joint Undergraduate Student Faculty Research Fund helped fund books and supplies for her research.

It also covered travel expenses to the National Science Teaching Association National Conference (NSTA) in Houston, Texas, in April 2022 where she presented her research. "I loved it," she exclaimed about the conference. "It was a great professional development experience."

When she graduates, Courtney plans to remain in Pennsylvania to teach special education. "Eventually I'd like to earn a doctorate in education, become a professor, and inspire upcoming teachers," she said. Because she received scholarship help, she also looks forward to giving back financially to the SU Foundation to help students like her.

Dr. Sieber's Story


HONOR SOCIETY MEMBER

Current computer science students at Shippensburg may not know the name Dr. James L. Sieber '58, but they benefit from his legacy. Dr. Sieber, who chaired the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science from 1963 to 1985, helped create the computer science major.

Now, computer science majors can benefit from a scholarship in his name. Dr. Sieber passed away in October 2020 and, through his will, established the **Dr. James L. Sieber Computer Science Scholarship**, a four-year award for first-year computer science majors.

Dr. Sieber graduated from Shippensburg State Teachers College in 1958 with bachelor's degrees in mathematics and physics. He went on to earn his master's and doctorate degrees in mathematics from The Pennsylvania State University.

In 1963, he returned to Shippensburg as an assistant professor of mathematics. The following year he was named department chair and held that position for 21 years. During his tenure as chair, Dr. Sieber led the development of the undergraduate majors in both mathematics and computer science, as well as graduate programs in both areas. Dr. Sieber also served as acting director of



the University's Computer Center and was director of one of the first computer camps in the nation for high school students.

A proponent of mathematics education, Dr. Sieber directed five National Science Foundation Institutes for Secondary School Teachers and served on the executive board of the Pennsylvania Council of Teachers of Mathematics.

Dr. Sieber was a lifelong learner who conducted research and further study at the University of Oklahoma, the University of Tennessee, and Edinburgh (Scotland) University. He was published numerous times in professional mathematics and computer science journals. As a member of Shippensburg's Class of 1958, Dr. Sieber served

on the Alumni Association Board of Directors, including one term as president in 1990.

Dr. Sieber retired in 2002 after serving 39 years on the faculty.




The SU Foundation manages 457 endowment fund accounts, 269 temporarily restricted accounts, and 102 temporary service accounts.

Indirect support is dollars that have been added to the principal of an endowment for the benefit of the students, programs, and faculty at the University, and are restricted by the donor for a specific purpose.


Over the past 10 years, funding from the SU Foundation to support students, faculty, and programs at Shippensburg University totaled **\$54,726,392**.

Sources of contributions by category






